3. The classification of surgical operations contained in the *First* Classifica-Schedule is the classification to be adopted for the purposes of these surgical Regulations. operations.

5. (1) Subject to regulation 6 and any exceptions contained in the Third Schedule, there shall be paid by or on behalf of every patient who enters into a private arrangement with a consultant for the payment of any fees in respect of any service mentioned in that Schedule such fee, not exceeding the maximum fee that a consultant may charge in respect of that service.

(2) Notwithstanding paragraph (1), a patient is not entitled to pay fees to a consultant if that patient is admitted to a public ward and, not less than 2 days before his discharge, is without his consent in writing, admitted to a private ward.

Limitation of consultants' fees

- 6. Where
- (a)the services of more than one consultant are necessary in a series of treatments for the relief of a particular condition of a patient; and
- (b) the total sum that, in accordance with regulation 5, those consultants taken together may charge exceeds \$1 000,

then the amount charged shall be equally proportioned among the consultants in such a manner that the total sum to be paid by the patient does not exceed \$1 000.

**9.** (1) Where, in any case not provided for by these Regulations, Fees in the Hospital Director is satisfied that by reason of

cases not otherwise provided for.

- (a) the ability or willingness of a patient to pay; or
- (b) the coverage of a patient by an insurance scheme policy,

fees ought to be paid by or on behalf of that patient in respect of services, accommodation or treatment, that patient may be charged such fees not exceeding one half of the maximum fees payable by patients in a private room in respect of such services, accommodation or treatment.

(2) Notwithstanding paragraph (1), where a patient is admitted to a public ward, that patient shall not be required to pay any fees to a consultant unless the Hospital Director so certifies.

**10.** (1) Subject to paragraph (2), fees charged pursuant to these Persons by Regulations are payable by a patient who has been provided with the accommodation, treatment or services for which such fees are chargeable.

- (2) Fees charged under these Regulations are payable by
- (a) the parent or, as the case may be, guardian of the patient if the patient is a minor;
- (b) any person who has, in writing, accepted responsibility for payment of fees charged.

Waiver of fees.
 12. Notwithstanding anything contained in these Regulations, the Hospital Director may, with the approval of the Minister, waive all or part of any fees payable under these Regulations.

Consultant's option. Third Schedule. **13.** (1) Fees in respect of services mentioned in the *Third Schedule* may, at the option of the consultant, be paid into the Public Treasury or directly to the consultant.

(2) Where, by virtue of paragraph (1), fees are paid into the Public Treasury, the consultant is entitled to a non-pensionable allowance amounting to 90 per cent of such fees, and if they are paid directly to the consultant, he is entitled to retain the full amount thereof.

No agreement for payment of fees in contravention of regulations. 14. No person shall enter into any agreement for the payment of fees in respect of accommodation, treatment or services provided at the Hospital except in accordance with these Regulations.
