TRAFFIC CONTROL (PARTY MONARCH FINALS)
RULES, 2009

The Commissioner, in exercise of the powers conferred on him by section 23(2) of the *Police Act*, with the approval of the Minister, makes the following Rules:

1. These Rules may be cited as the *Traffic Control (Party Monarch Finals) Rules, 2009*.

2. In these Rules,

“emergency vehicle” means a vehicle used by

- (a) the Barbados Red Cross;
- (b) the Barbados Fire Service;
- (c) the Emergency Management Department; or
- (d) an ambulance service;

“relevant period” means from 06:00 hours on Sunday, 26th July, 2009 to 01:00 hours on Monday, 27th July, 2009.

“vehicle” has the meaning assigned to it by section 2 of the *Road Traffic Act*. Cap. 295.

3. During the relevant period no person shall park or allow a vehicle to remain stationary on any of the following roads except for the purpose of picking up or setting down passengers:

- (a) Portland Road;
- (b) Indian Ground Road;
- (c) Pleasant Hall Road;
- (d) Welchtown Road;
- (e) Benn Hill Road;
- (f) Mile and A Quarter Road;
- (g) Diamond Corner Road; and
- (h) Prospect Road

in the parish of Saint Peter.

4. During the relevant period, all drivers and riders of vehicles, pedestrians and riders or leaders of animals using any of the roads specified in paragraph 3 shall exercise caution and shall comply with any order given by a member of the Police Force in uniform.

5. Any person who contravenes these Rules or fails to comply with any order given by a member of the Police Force in uniform is guilty of an offence and is liable on summary conviction to a fine of \$500 or to imprisonment for a term of 3 months.

6. These Rules do not apply to vehicles used by the Police Force, Barbados Defence Force or any emergency vehicle.
