TRAFFIC CONTROL (PIC-O-DE-CROP FINALS) RULES, 2015

The Commissioner, in exercise of the powers conferred on him by section 23(2) of the *Police Act*, with the approval of the Minister, makes the following Rules:

1. These Rules may be cited as the *Traffic Control (Pic-O-De-Crop Finals) Rules, 2015*.

2. In these Rules,

“alternate emergency route” means an alternate route which commences at Fontabelle Road and proceeds along Cheapside Road, Broad Street, Charles Duncan O’Neal Bridge, Fairchild Street, River Road and Martindale’s Road to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, in the parish of Saint Michael;

“emergency route” means a route which commences at President Kennedy Drive and proceeds along Westbury Road, Passage Road, Country Road, Roebuck Street, Halls Road and Martindale’s Road to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, in the parish of Saint Michael;

“emergency vehicle” means a vehicle used by

- (a) the Barbados Red Cross;
- (b) the Emergency Management Department; or
- (c) an ambulance service;

“Festival Committee” means the Crop Over Festival Committee of the Ministry responsible for Culture, Sports and Youth;

“relevant period” means from 16:00 hours on Friday, 31st July, 2015 to 02:00 hours on Saturday, 1st August, 2015;

“vehicle” has the meaning assigned to it by section 2 of the *Road Traffic Act*, Cap. 295.

3. During the relevant period, Fontabelle Road, from its junction with Kensington New Road to its junction with Holborn Circle, in the parish of Saint Michael shall be closed to all vehicular traffic except vehicles used by members of the Festival Committee.

4. During the relevant period, President Kennedy Drive, from its junction with Westbury Road to its junction with Holborn Circle, in the parish of Saint Michael shall be closed to all through traffic.

5. During the relevant period, no person shall park along Princess Alice Highway, from its junction with Cowell Street to its junction with Harbour Road, in the parish of Saint Michael.

6. During the relevant period, no driver or person in charge of a vehicle shall park or allow the vehicle to remain stationary on any of the following roads or the adjoining footpaths except for the purpose of picking up or setting down passengers:

- (a) Baxters Road;
- (b) Eagle Hall Road;
- (c) Fontabelle Road, from its junction with Lakes Folly Road to its junction with President Kennedy Drive;
- (d) Kensington New Road;
- (e) Prescod Boulevard;
- (f) President Kennedy Drive;
- (g) Redman Drive;

- (h) Spring Garden Highway; and
- (i) Westbury Road, from its junction with President Kennedy Drive to its junction with Baxters Road,

in the parish of Saint Michael.

7. During the relevant period, Fontabelle Road, from its junction with Redman Drive to its junction with Holborn Circle, in the parish of Saint Michael shall be a one-way street with traffic travelling in two lanes in the direction of Holborn Circle.

8. During the relevant period, no person shall park or allow a vehicle to remain stationary along the emergency route or the alternate emergency route except for the purpose of picking up or setting down passengers.

9. All drivers and riders of vehicles, pedestrians and riders or leaders of animals using any of the roads specified in paragraphs 3, 5, 6 and 7 or any of the routes specified in paragraph 8 shall exercise caution and shall comply with any order given by a member of the Police Force in uniform.

10. Any person who contravenes these Rules or fails to comply with any order given by a member of the Police Force in uniform is guilty of an offence and is liable on summary conviction to a fine of \$500 or to imprisonment for a term of 3 months.

11. These Rules do not apply to vehicles used by the Police Force, the Barbados Defence Force, the Barbados Fire Service or any emergency vehicle.
